

Globular Flower Heads

Acacia elongata (Swamp Wattle)

The Swamp Wattle has bright yellow flowers and long phyllodes with three longitudinal veins.

The phyllodes can be up to 15cm long and 4mm wide.

It flowers from late winter into spring.



Acacia gordonii (Gordon's Wattle)

This endangered species is recognised by its bright yellow globular flowers.

Its bunched leaves are different to *A. echinula* (Hedgehog Wattle), and its longer peduncles (stalks) distinguishes it from *A. baueri* (Tiny Wattle).

Flowering in early spring, it is mainly found in the lower Blue Mountains.



Acacia hispidula (Little Harsh Acacia)

The Little Harsh Acacia, also known as the Rough-leaved Acacia, has rough ovate leaves.

Its flowers are about 10mm in diameter. It is a small tree up to 2 metres in height.

It flowers in late summer into autumn and can be found in the lower Blue Mountains.



Acacia juncifolia (Rush-leaved Wattle)

The Rush-leaved Wattle's long slender "reaching for the sky" phyllodes and dark yellow flowers highlight this acacia.

There's often a prominent longitudinal vein on its hairless phyllodes.

It flowers from winter into spring.
